Did you know that an engendered and Federally protected plant can be found in Monrovia's Hillside Wilderness Preserve? Braunton's milk-vetch (Astragalus brauntonii) can be found along the Lower Clamshell Trail. Ensuring we do our part to protect this critical habitat is just one reason why the Hillside Wilderness Preserve is important to us all. Braunton's milkvetch (Astragalus brauntonii) grows closely with other California native plants, including manzanita, buckwheat, beargrass, chamise, ceanothus, Tecate cypress, and many species of oak and pine. It can be found in Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura Counties. Native bees and ants pollinate the Braunton's milk-vetch (Astragalus brauntonii), which blooms from March to July. It can grow up to 5 feet tall but lives only 2-3 years. Following the 2020 Bobcat Fire, new sprouts of Braunton's milk-vetch (Astragalus brauntonii) were quickly identified and continue to thrive.

Monrovia's Hillside Wilderness Preserve is a Critical Habitat area and is protected by Monrovia Municipal Code 12.32.050. Healthy ecosystems depend on plant and animal species as their foundations. When a species becomes endangered, it is a sign that the ecosystem is slowly falling apart. Each species that is lost triggers the loss of other species within its ecosystem. Humans depend on healthy ecosystems to purify our environment.

LIVING WITH URBAN WILDLIFE

Enjoy and celebrate wildlife with respect and understanding.

City life isn't easy for wildlife. For most species, it means losing their native habitats and navigating people, lights and traffic. Life for wild animals in urban areas consists of many challenges like avoiding crowds and scavenging for food waste and locating shelter to ensure their survival. We can do our part to help wildlife by limiting access to food and water for the animals

Things we can do to minimize undesired interaction with local wildlife

- Remove any outdoor pet food, including bird feeders · Pick up fruit as soon as it falls to the ground
- Keep barbecue grills clean
- Eliminate access to water on your property, like standing water or bird baths
- Wildlife-proof garbage in sturdy containers with tight fitting lids Keep trash in a secure location and only take out trash the morning pick up is scheduled
- Keep compost in secure containers
- Secure your garage and don't leave the door open
- · Cover your garden with chicken wire
- Trim overgrown landscaping and clear brush, trim hedges 6"-12" off the ground
- Close off crawl spaces under decks and around buildings
- Invest in motion detecting lights that make sound when activated, motion sensing water sprayers, or roll bar fencing also referred to as "coyote rollers"

When you see wildlife in your neighborhood here are some things you can do to ensure the wildlife do not become comfortable near your home:

### **History of Hillside Wilderness Preserve**

July 11, 2000 - In response to proposed residential development in our hillides, Monrovia voters approved Measure A and Measure 8. The adoption of Measure A created the "Hildide Wildemass Preserve" and "Hildide Recreation" zoning designations, while approval of Measure 8 import a base tax on Nonrowa properties that generated to million dollars, to be paid lack-over 50 years, in order to indue the acquisition of privately held hildide properties.

easure 8 also authorized the collection of \$80,000 per year for maintenance efforts in the hillside. 2000-2004 - With the assistances of the Wilderness Preserve Steering Committee, the City and Committee identified the order in which the properties should be purchased and worked on securing grants. A total of forty-eight (48) public meetings were held to discuss hillside and open space related issue

The City was able to leverage the monies generated from Measure B to obtain additional grant funding which was used to acquire eleven (11) privatel owned hillside properties for more than 24 million dollars. These purchases resulted in the City gaining ownership of 1,416 acres of hillside property that


